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Course description:

The theme of this course is civic engagement construed broadly. We will begin by examining justifications for freedom of speech. We will then examine possible limits on certain kinds of speech including hate speech and the promulgation of 'fake news'. We will then turn to civil disobedience and examine whether civil disobedience is ever justified, and what response the state should take towards those who break the law for purported moral reasons. Next we will examine whether claims of conscience ought to be afforded special legal protections. Lastly, we will look at whether the right to vote ought to be extended to minors, and whether there is a moral duty to vote. A space is reserved for a topic to be determined by the class. The goal is to have a mix of theoretical and applied readings so that there will be something for everyone.

Participation Grade:
